














Listen Up Music Workshops

Stage 5 History







Stage 5 borrowed a Memorial Box from the Australian War Memorial as part of their studies about the Second World War. The box contained educational resources, equipment, clothing and other war mementos giving students new experiences and insights into the world at that time.

Stage 5 Science Experiments

Throughout Term 4, Stage 5 students in Alex and Michael's class conducted a number of exciting chemistry experiments. Morokai demonstrated how Carbon Dioxide gas can inflate a balloon – which the class really enjoyed! MJ also showed the class how to make 'elephant toothpaste' in which Hydrogen Peroxide was mixed with oxygen, food dye and water to create bubbles and foam. The class also tried to make 'Rock Candy' by diluting sugar into boiling water and letting it settle ... the colourful glasses stayed in class for a week and we were surprised by the results by the time they were checked on Friday.

Pickled!

Recently we have been taking advantage of the beautiful variety of vegetables that were planted in the Berne garden by Michael and his class last term. The students and staff have been harvesting luscious lettuce, spectacular spinach, handfuls of herbs, a zillion zucchini, and a corral of cucumbers.

There have been so many of the cucumbers that it was quickly becoming an issue. Our solution to the pickle we found ourselves in was to pickle our crowd of cucumbers.

Here is our simple pickle recipe that can be used for cucumbers, onions or any vegetables you please.

- Declan Martin, Stage 5 Teacher

Ingredients

- ½ Kilo of the vegetables of your choice
- 2 sprigs fresh herbs, such as thyme, dill, or rosemary (optional)
- 1 to 2 teaspoons whole spices, such as black peppercorns, coriander, or mustard seeds (optional)
- 1 teaspoon dried herbs or ground spices (optional)
- 2 cloves garlic, smashed or sliced (optional)
- 1 cup vinegar, such as white, apple cider, or rice
- 1 cup water
- 1 tablespoon kosher salt, or 2 teaspoons pickling salt
- 1 tablespoon granulated sugar (optional)






Instructions

- 1. **Prepare the jars.** Wash wide-mouth jars, lids, and rings in warm, soapy water and rinse well. Set aside to dray.
- 2. **Prepare the vegetables.** Wash and dry vegetables. Peel carrots. Cut vegetables into desired shapes and sizes.
- 3. Add the flavourings. Divide the herbs, spices, or garlic you are using between the jars.
- 4. **Add the vegetables.** Pack the vegetables. Pack them in as tightly as you can without smashing.
- 5. **Make the brine.** Place vinegar, water, salt, and sugar (if using) in a small saucepan over high heat. Bring to a boil, stirring to dissolve the salt and sugar. Pour the brine over the vegetables, filling each jar to within ½ inch of the top. You might not use all the brine.
- 6. **Remove air bubbles.** Gently tap the jars against the counter a few times to remove all the air bubbles. Top off with more brine if necessary.
- 7. **Seal the jars.** Place the lids on the jars and screw on the rings until tight.
- 8. **Cool and refrigerate.** Let the jars cool to room temperature. Store the pickles in refrigerator. The pickles will improve with flavour as they age try to wait at least 48 hours before opening.

Work Experience

This term Stage 5 students undertook work experience placements in a wide range of fields including construction, hairdressing, bike retail and repairs, childcare, hospitality, auto repairs, office work, labouring and cleaning. The John Berne School Work Experience Program can be challenging for our students. It necessitates students travelling to sometimes unfamiliar locations, working with people they might not know, possibly starting early in the morning or working long hours and being expected to perform tasks they may not enjoy. Students are well monitored and supported at all stages of their work placement by their teachers and the program can play an important role in building self confidence and learning valuable work and life skills. Congratulations to all our students who successfully completed work experience this term and thank you to the many employers who gave them the opportunity.

All students participated enthusiastically and it was a great way to start Term 4!




