Each year we have a theme to focus on as we journey together as a Christian, Catholic and Marist community. Last year's theme was "Known and Loved"- dignity for all. In 2023 we will reflect on the theme "Created and Called"- a revolution of love and tenderness. During our assemblies, liturgies and times of prayer we will consider this theme and its meaning in our individual lives and for us as a Berne community. For me, this theme is about God creating us and calling us to be witnesses for Him and if we put our faith in God and follow where he leads we will find our "calling" and the place where we are needed to show his love.

The following excerpt from the Marist documents may help make sense of how to reflect in our daily lives on the theme of "Created and Called":

"Be who God created you to be and you will set the world on fire". These words from St Catherine of Siena express our deepest desire to be our deepest and truest selves in response to being known and loved by God. God's love changes us and by sharing God's love at Berne we see significant changes in the young people entrusted into our care. The change may be slow and at times hard to see, however, the change is occurring through God's love for all.

At times we might feel we don't understand who God has created us to be, or it feels we are far from who God wants us to be and we are not setting the world on fire. At these times I find solace in the words of Michelangelo as he believed a sculptor was a tool of God, not creating but simply revealing the powerful figures already there. He once said, "I saw the angel in the marble and carved it to set it free". We must trust that we are already created as God desires us to be but our faith and his love shapes us to make a difference in the world. I ask you not to be afraid to do something great with your life. God has created each and every one of us and called us to be witnesses to our faith. Let us have the courage to not waste a moment and start a revolution of love and tenderness.

As Easter approaches, I would like to take a moment to extend my warmest wishes to the The John Berne School community. This is a time of great significance for Christians around the world as we celebrate the hope and renewal Christ's resurrection brings to our lives. May this Easter season be a time of reflection, gratitude, and joy for each and every one of you. May you be surrounded by the love and support of your family, friends and community, and may you find comfort in the knowledge that you are a part of a greater spiritual family that shares in your faith and values. The courses were labelled green, blue, red and black according to their difficulty and all students were able to successfully complete the first three courses with the exception of Ewan who made it all the way through the black.

On Day 3, Friday 9th March, students went to Strathfield for laser tag and bowling. This provided a well needed rest after the very adventurous previous two days. This was followed by a picnic lunch in the Richard Murden Reserve with a game of touch and a stroll.














Thank you

Anti-bullying Day

During week seven, the pupils of John Berne took part in a school assembly to take a stand with other Australian schools united in their communities to celebrate the National Day of Action against Bullying and Violence (NDA).

The National Day of Action is Australia's key anti-bullying event for schools to take a stand together against bullying. The day brings together more than 60% of schools nationwide, involving more than two million students in finding workable solutions to address bullying and violence. The theme for 2023 was REACH OUT. The idea is that by REACHing OUT together,

schools can promote inclusion, respect and community belonging for all students across Australia.

At the John Berne school we encourage the values of inclusion, respect and a sense of belonging in our community. Our students took part in group discussions and various activities in their pastoral care groups which promote anti-bullying.

The John Berne School takes incidents of bullying very seriously and has a process to reduce and resolve incidents that may occur at our school. This assembly also provided an opportunity early in the year, to inform students of our zero tolerance to bullying and what the processes are, if ever they witness or are bullied themselves.


Kitchen Update
