Dear parents, carers, and friends of Berne



May is a special month for many Catholics around the world, as it is dedicated to honouring the Blessed Virgin Mary, mother of Jesus Christ. During the month of May, there are several special devotions and traditions Catholics participate in as a way of showing respect and love for Mary. For example, some people like to recite the Rosary daily.

One reason why May is a particularly fitting month for honouring Mary is because it is the beginning of Spring in

the Northern Hemisphere and Spring is typically associated with new life and growth. This can be seen as a metaphor for Mary's role as mother to all Christians.

It is also worth noting May is the month in which many important feast days take place, such as the Feast of the Ascension and Pentecost Sunday. These Feast days help to anchor Mary's month of special devotion within the broader context of the liturgical year, reminding us our faith is a community effort that extends beyond individual piety or devotion.

Considering these many traditions and occasions, Term 2 was a wonderful time for Catholics to deepen their devotion to Mary and to reflect on her powerful presence in our lives as faithful followers of Christ. As a Marist school it was important for us to remember Marcellin Champagnat's deep devotion to Mary as he experienced many moments of grace and closeness to her throughout his life. One such moment occurred during a particularly harsh winter when he learned a fellow Brother in a town far away had been struck with a serious illness. Concerned about the young Brother, Marcellin and Brother Stanislaus set out on a 22-kilometre journey across rough countryside to visit him.

On their return trip, walking through heavily timbered territory, the two men were caught in the full fury of one of the region's worst snowstorms. They became lost, leading to hours of wandering on the slopes of Mount Pilat and were completely exhausted. Night set in and the possibility of death in the snow increased with each passing hour. It was at this point both men turned to Mary for help and prayed the Memorare.

Within a short while, they saw a lantern, not too far in the distance. A local farmer, Mr Donnet, had left his house to enter a nearby stable as he did every night. On this particular evening however, he took an unusual route and did not enter the stable through a convenient door in the wall of the house. *Continued next page*

Celebrating 25 Years

On April 27th we proudly celebrated 25 years of Marist education at The John Berne School. In April 1998 Berne opened its doors enrolling its first 30 students in facilities that were part of the old St Thomas Boys High School site at Lewisham. From humble beginnings, the school buildings have been extensively renovated and we now share the site with Eileen O'Connor Catholic College.

Father Gavin Foster SM, Chaplin St Joseph College Hunters Hill and Fr Phil Robson CM, a Berne staff member from the school's first year, concelebrated Mass held in St Thomas Becket Parish Hall. We were delighted to welcome many honoured guests on this special occasion: Br Peter Carroll fms, Provincial of Marist Star of the Sea Province; Br Darren Burge fms, Vice Provincial and previous Principal of The John Berne School; Br Michael Callinan fms; Dr Frank Malloy, National Director Marist Schools Australia Limited; Dr John Kyle-Robinson, Regional Director Marist Schools Australia Limited; Professor Br David Hall fms, Chair of Marist Schools Australia Limited Board and members of The John Berne School Advisory Council. We were also delighted that several past staff members, volunteers and past parents could join us and one of the highlights of the occasion was hearing them share stories of their years at Berne.

Of course another highlight of this wonderful day was one of our traditions - the famous Berne sausage sizzle!

In a moving speech delivered by Berne's founding Principal, Br Michael Flanagan fms, he shared his inspirations for the school's motto, Hope Always. Br Michael laid the foundations for Berne's mission and purpose and the Marist values underlying the work we continue to do here today.



Br Michael Flanagan's speech:

"Hope Always...Spes Semper Where did the motto of this unique school come from? There were two strands that came together in my mind sometime in 1997 at Winston Hills.

The first was a quote of Robert Kennedy's (paraphrase): "He or she who hopes for a perfect world, participates in the hope of Christ." Hoping for the absolute best for every person is the measure of the hope Christ has for each of us. Christ's hope is a hope on Steroids.... It's magnificent in its scope.

The second was a line from a Willie Nelson song: "I'll be loving you always." Some of the greatest insights into the nature of God...and therefore our nature...can be heard in popular songs. We believe in an "always" God...a God that loves us always, stays with us always, perseveres with us always, forgives us always. This does not change if we fail or don't measure up. Our souls can never be lost. We cannot be lost to God. Ever.

Thus, two words came together: Hope and Always. Hope Always.
The John Berne School is named after a street kid that Marcellin Champagnat loved as his own and never lost hope in. The boy changed and became a Brother, Br Nilamon, dying in Champagnat's arms thanking him for all he had done for him.

This school exists to hope in each of its students as Christ hopes in them. It has the courage to take on this daunting task because our God loves us all, equally, and forever.

Sempiternam. For all time; Always; For ever more."


Love of Learning Day

Work Experience

It is difficult to operate outside your comfort zone, and students are encouraged to use work experience as an opportunity to not only try new jobs, but to practice fitting in with new situations and develop confidence when meeting and interacting with new people. Workplace learning also provides exposure to a range of occupations to allow students to make informed choices about their career preferences when they leave school.


Work experience week in Term 2 saw Stage 5 students in a range of different workplace occupations including administration, hospitality, retail, education, farming, social work, plumbing, fitness training, carpentry, building, car mechanics, hairdressing, painting and at a veterinary practice. Three of our hardworking students have reported that they have been offered part-time work through their work experience placements which is a great result.

Plans Plans

Having to find an employer at the last minute puts unnecessary pressure on everyone involved, and often results in frustration when students are refused many times when they make their phone calls to employers. Students are encouraged to source and approach employers themselves, as these are valuable work-related skills. The assistance provided by families in finding positions is certainly appreciated, and we do ask that you continue to support your sons/daughters in their attempts to find work, by strongly encouraging them to make phone calls, or visit workplaces in person.













Positive Paws Program

This term has seen yet another successful course at the Guide Dog Puppy Program. The students who were lucky enough to attend will be graduating the training course at the end of term and receiving their Puppy Guide Dog training certificates.

The students have had the chance to experience the different types of blindness that Guide Dog owners have by wearing special glasses and having to perform certain tasks to experience the difficulties people with limited vision have in their day-to-day life.

The pupils have learnt to look at the puppy's body language, how they react to certain situations, working in pairs to evaluate the puppies' strengths and weaknesses. All this is invaluable to the trainers and the information feedback is taken very seriously.



Pupils have also been lucky enough to talk with real life Guide Dog trainers and their dogs in training.

All the pupils have enjoyed the term and learnt a lot of new skills. Congratulations to Jayden and Johnathon who have been invited to continue with the program as mentors next term.

Get Involved

Puppy Raising Program



At eight weeks of age, our Guide Dog pups are placed in the community with volunteer Puppy Raisers. These families or individuals ensure that our new puppy recruits get the best possible care, in a loving home environment while receiving necessary training.

These special, dedicated Puppy Raisers all have one thing in common – they embrace the opportunity to help change people's lives forever.

What is required?

Puppy Raising is a 12-14 month commitment. During that time, Raisers are responsible for:

- Making the pup part of your family and keeping them safe.
- Attending weekly training sessions in your area.
- Have a yard with dog-proof fencing unless you live in a flat or unit.
- Have access to a car to transport your pup.
- Teaching the pup some basics skills, including sitting nicely when being groomed, walking nicely on a lead, good house manners, and providing regular socialisation experiences.
- Establishing good toileting, feeding, sleeping, and walking routines.
- Live in the areas of Sydney, Blue Mountains, Central Coast, Newcastle, South Coast, Southern Highlands or Canberra/Queanbeyan. This is to ensure your pup can attend regular training sessions.
- Be home for most of the day; your pup must not be left alone for more than four hours at a time without supervision and human company.
- · Be available to walk your pup each day.
- Allow your pup to sleep and spend time indoors.

How do I apply?

Dadirri



During this term students in Stage 5 have been learning about Indigenous Spirituality as part of their religious studies. Our students engaged in 'Dadirri', an ancient practise of deep and respectful listening to build community – a way of encouraging people to explore and learn from the ancient heritage of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture, knowledge and understanding. This practise aims to help young people to have appreciation for the land and to recognise the vitality of this appreciation for our future. Students valued this experience in quiet, still awareness and are to be commended for their active and respectful participation.

Notifying the School about Student Absences

As we reach the end of the second term for 2023 it is timely to remind our parent/carer community of the requirements around student attendance. In order to comply with the Education Act, parents or carers must notify the school office with a reason for their child's absence from school on the morning of the absence. Additionally, a written note, medical certificate or email must be sent to the school within 7 days of a student absence. Unexplained absences are recorded immediately on a student's attendance record unless the school receives a legitimate reason for absence. Days absent without explanation are recorded on all student reports.

We ask for administrative purposes that all correspondence regarding student absences be directed to the school office by email office@johnberneschool.org, SMS 0439 144 497 or phone 9560 9260 (a message can be left on our answering machine outside of school hours). Again, please remember that you need to provide a reason for your child's absence. Please do not assume if you speak with a teacher or school counsellor about your child's absence that the information will be passed on to the school office.

Students, together with parents and carers, are reminded of the importance of punctuality as both a requirement upon enrolment and a significant contributor to student learning.

National Reconciliation Week

This year, National Reconciliation Week was celebrated from 27 May to 3 June. As this is the same week our Stage 5 students were out on work experience, students in Craig and Mel's class marked this occasion in Week 5 by creating a classroom DISPLAY. We researched what traditional land everyone in the class lived on, we spoke about what the theme "Be a Voice for Generations" means and how each of us can work towards achieving reconciliation in Australia.

This theme was the main focus for this term's assembly and Grant and Declan delivered a presentation to the students about the 1967 Referendum, the Mabo decision and Sorry Day. We know there is so much more to be done, and this year's theme encourages all of us to be a voice of reconciliation in our daily lives.
