# Stage 5 Camp

During this term, Stage 5 hosted two thriving camps near Bundeena in the Royal National Park. Students were divided into two groups and each group enjoyed a three-day, two-night expedition filled with bushwalking, fishing, canoeing, and swimming activities.

Arriving at camp, students demonstrated remarkable efficiency in setting up and readily embraced their new environment. What truly made our camp exceptional was its proximity to the beach, offering students the freedom to swim and fish at their leisure. Both groups were given the chance to venture into the Royal National Park, participating in daytime bushwalks and evening fishing expeditions.

The students this year exhibited remarkable prowess in fishing, with many achieving notable catches. A special mention goes out to Cruz, Jake and Hugh. Cruz landed a silver bream and Jake landed a flat head both measuring over 40 centimetres. Whilst Hugh successfully caught a mud crab large enough to eat. These feats could potentially be one of the largest catches in Berne camp history.

The first group of students had the opportunity to hike a 6km trail to reach the Figure 8 pools. They were very fortunate to encounter favourable weather conditions, which allowed them to undertake this journey. Taking on the challenge, every student successfully completed the hike. Once students reached their destination, the group took a moment to appreciate the picturesque view, with some choosing to take a dip in the rock pools while others tried their hand at crab-catching with only Lucien successfully catching a small one.

The second group was treated to a coastal walk and a rejuvenating swim at Wattamolla which was definitely needed. While the trek wasn't as lengthy as the Figure 8 pools hike, one of the standout moments at Wattamolla was the chance to swim near a charming waterfall. Most students eagerly plunged into the water, with some even daring to venture underneath the waterfall.

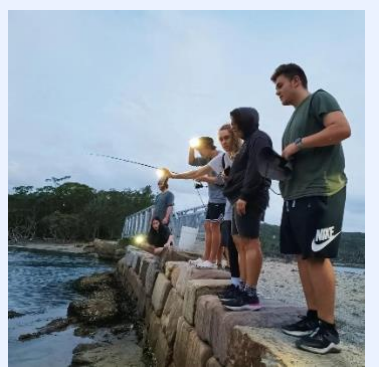
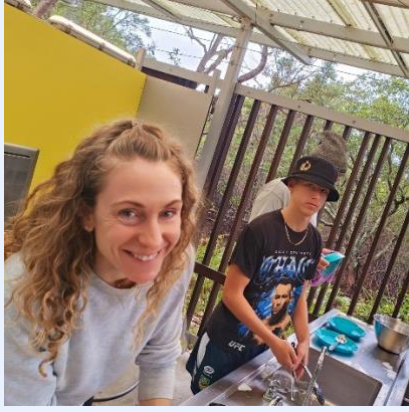
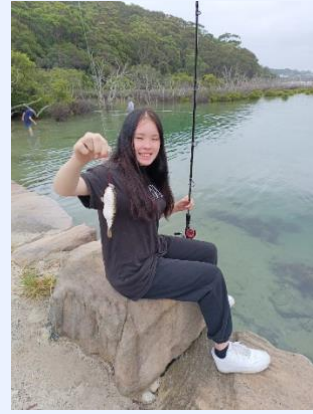

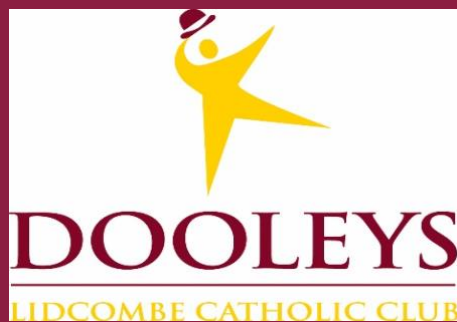


# Work Experience

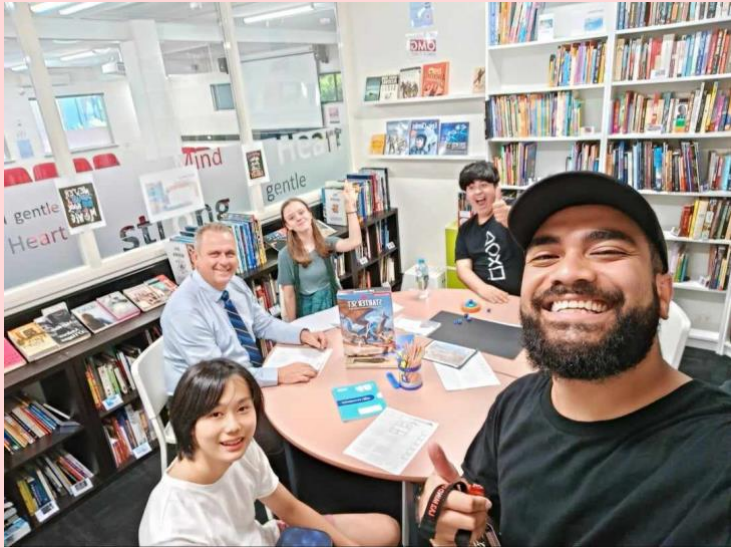

# School Travel Passes

## ~ Information for parents and students

### School Travel Passes

Students who require a School Opal card or travel pass but have not yet applied need to [apply](#) or [update](#) their details as soon as possible.

In the Opal network, students should travel with a Child/Youth Opal card until they receive their valid School Opal card. If outside Greater Sydney, parents should contact their [local bus operator](#) to discuss their travel needs.

New Student Opal cards (including new Term Bus Passes) will be sent to the student's nominated postal address within two weeks of their application being approved.

Students living in rural and regional areas will receive their travel pass from their nominated transport operator. It may be issued via their school or be sent directly to them at home. **Note:** some rural and regional operators do not issue travel passes. Students/parents should confirm with their nominated operator if they do not receive a pass.

### Terms of Use

Students using School Opal cards must tap on and tap off in line with the [Opal terms of use](#).

This includes travel within the approved times between 6.30am and 7.00pm from Monday to Friday on school days only. Students must use their child/youth Opal for any travel outside these times.

All students are required to comply with the [Student code of conduct](#). The code of conduct aims to ensure the safety and well-being of school children and other passengers. It is important that parents ensure their child is aware of this, as failure to comply with the code of conduct can result in a suspension from travel.
